Training Reinforces Safety and Unity Among District One Responders

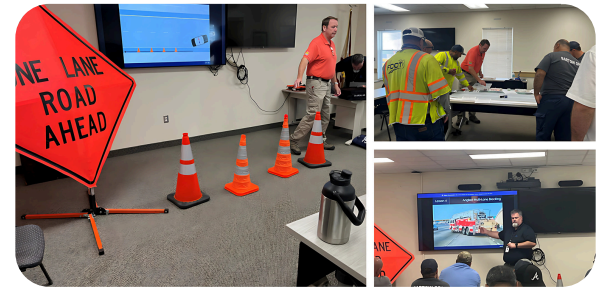
On June 3, 2025, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) District One Traffic Incident Management (TIM) program hosted the National First Responder (SHRP2) Training at FDOT Bartow Operations in Bartow, Florida. The four-hour in-person session brought together responders to reinforce the principles of safe, quick clearance and responder safety on Florida's highways.

The training was led by Tom Arsenault, TIM Program Manager, and Beau Baggett, Assistant TIM Program Manager, for FDOT District One. Their instruction provided both classroom learning and an interactive tabletop exercise where participants engaged in a hands-on mock incident response to apply TIM strategies in real-time.

This nationally recognized training emphasizes coordinated incident response, traffic incident scene management, and best practices for protecting responders and the traveling public. Attendees walked away not only with essential safety strategies but also a renewed sense of purpose and teamwork.

"I want to really thank you all for the great training you have provided. 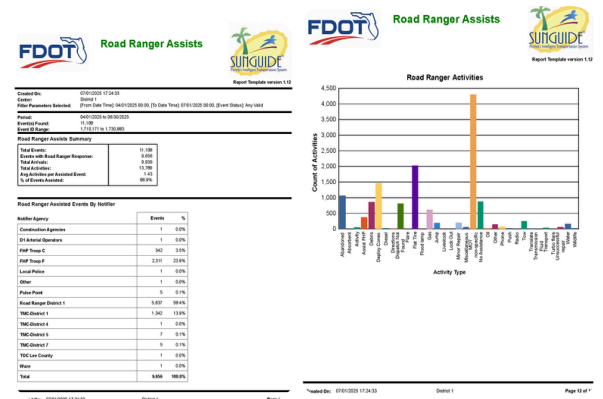

Honoring TIM Champions: Florida Highway Patrol's Traffic Homicide Unit Recognized



FDOT District One has excelled in recognizing champions through initiatives such as the Shoutout Program, Employee of the Month, and Employee of the Quarter. During the TIM Team Meetings held in June 2025, the District One TIM Program honored the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) Traffic Homicide Unit for their ongoing support and commitment to improving traffic incident clearance and safety.

The District One TIM Team consists of four active teams: the Collier Lee Charlotte, Sarasota Manatee, Polk, and Heartland TIM Teams. The Heartland TIM Team convenes quarterly to review five or six major incidents, most of which result in significant State Road closures due to fatal crashes. The FHP Traffic Homicide Unit plays a vital role in these reviews, offering detailed insights and photographs that help attendees understand the cause and impact of each incident.

These visual presentations are instrumental in illustrating the scope of the scene and the reasoning behind lengthy closures. As the saying goes, "A picture is worth a thousand words" and in TIM, it can mean the difference between assumption and understanding.

Clearing the roadway quickly and safely is not only about restoring traffic flow, it is about protecting lives. Timely clearance is critical, as every minute a freeway lane remains blocked increases the risk of a secondary crash by 2.8 percent, according to the [Federal Highway Administration](#). These secondary crashes often place first responders and motorists in even greater danger. TIM Champions play a vital role in managing scenes efficiently, ensuring seamless communication among agencies, and helping everyone get home safely. Their leadership and coordination directly influence how incidents are handled and how quickly normal travel can resume.

There are two distinct FHP Traffic Homicide Unit Teams in District One, one based in Venice and the other in Fort Myers. Each team was honored with a custom recognition plaque listing all team members. Captain Roberts, Special Operations Commander, shared, "The FHP Homicide Team is happy to support the District's TIM Program and are thankful for the recognition."

Steven Davis, District Traffic Operations Engineer and coordinator of the Recognition Team, stated: "District One Traffic Operations prioritizes consistent recognition, not just for our brave Road Rangers but for all our team members. While we understand the hard work, sacrifices, and passion they bring each day, it's vital to visibly acknowledge everyone's contributions. Recognition shows the public the value of what we do and reminds our teams that their efforts are appreciated. TIM Program recognition is especially important. Our Road Rangers often work in dangerous conditions or directly save lives. District One considers them first responders and recognizes the stress they face daily. We will continue to take pride in acknowledging their contributions as a core part of the TIM Program."



Recognizing TIM Champions is not just about celebration. It is about supporting the first responders who dedicate themselves to keeping Florida's roadways safe.
