Support Your Towing Partners at the 2025 Florida Tow Show

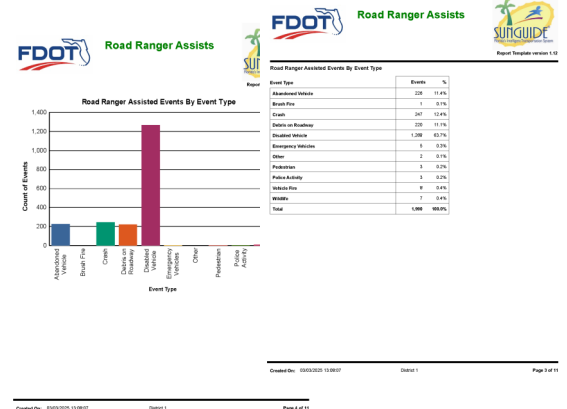

Supporting First Responders: Enhancing Safety and Reducing Secondary Incidents



With April being Distracted Driving Awareness Month, now is the perfect time to highlight the dangers first responders face on the road. Every time they step out to assist at an incident, they risk being struck by passing vehicles. Despite ongoing safety efforts, these incidents continue to rise. Road Rangers, law enforcement officers, firefighters, and tow truck operators have all been hit while working to clear crashes, with some suffering serious injuries or fatalities. Raising awareness and reinforcing Move Over laws are critical in preventing these tragedies.

When a traffic incident happens, first responders work to clear the roadway as quickly and safely as possible. Every minute a scene remains active increases the risk of a secondary crash, putting both responders and motorists in danger. Law enforcement, fire rescue, Road Rangers, towing services, Traffic Management Center (TMC) Operators, and asset maintenance crews all play a role in stabilizing the scene and getting traffic moving again. Quick clearance techniques, proper traffic control, extrication tools, and strong communication between agencies help reduce delays and improve safety.

The number of first responders struck while working has increased in recent months. Multiple Road Rangers, law enforcement officers, and tow truck operators have been hit while assisting at crash scenes. Some incidents resulted in minor injuries, while others led to life-threatening situations and fatalities. These tragedies highlight the urgent need for driver awareness, strong enforcement of Move Over laws, and safer work zones.

Secondary incidents are crashes that occur due to an initial (primary) incident. They often result from sudden slowdowns, inattentive driving, or unsafe maneuvers near the crash site. The likelihood of a secondary crash increases by 2.8% for each minute the primary incident remains unresolved. This statistic underscores the need for efficient incident management to minimize road closures and reduce risks for first responders.¹

Every agency on scene plays a role in ensuring safety, efficiency, and quick clearance. Law enforcement, fire rescue, Road Rangers, towing services, Traffic Management Center Operators, and asset maintenance crews all work together with the same goal, protecting lives, reducing congestion, and clearing the roadway as safely and quickly as possible. Strong coordination between all agencies helps reduce risks and prevent secondary crashes.

Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Teams support first responders by bringing together those who work along highways to share their experiences and challenges. One way this is accomplished is through live demonstrations and presentations from first responders who operate on the road daily. These demonstrations help responders better understand each other's roles at crash scenes, improving safety and coordination.

A great example is the Collier-Lee-Charlotte TIM Team Meeting on April 9, 2025, in Fort Myers, where attendees will get a firsthand look at how first responders utilize the Jaws of Life during major traffic incidents. South Trail Fire will conduct a live demonstration, with vehicles provided by Alligator Towing, giving responders the opportunity to see the extrication process up close and learn how to work safely alongside these operations.

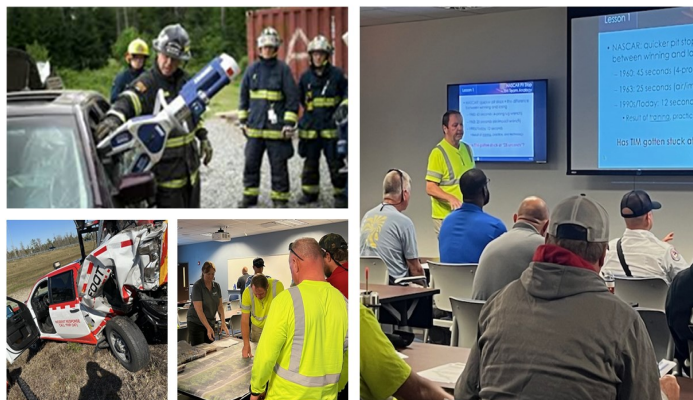
In addition to live demonstrations, there are many ways to improve responder safety on highways. TIM Responder Training teaches best practices for managing roadway incidents, while TIM Team Meetings strengthen coordination between agencies. After-Action Reviews (AARs) help assess major incidents and identify areas for improvement. Enforcing Move Over laws remains critical in protecting responders, and April's Distracted Driving Awareness Month is a timely reminder to reinforce driver attentiveness, especially near active scenes.

Make sure to attend your next TIM Team meeting, where you can collaborate, build relationships, and gain a better understanding of how responders contribute to incident response. Strong coordination keeps responders safer while working on the highways.
